Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Peace be with you!

The current circumstances remind me of Psalm 22:

My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?

Why so far from my call for help, from my cries of anguish?

It is with an outpouring of care, concern and consideration regarding the potential spread of the coronavirus that Bishop Estèvez has suspended all public Masses in the Diocese of St. Augustine until March 31. The Bishop has dispensed the faithful from their Sunday Mass obligation for the remainder of the month and possibly longer. Please see the Bishop's letter on our website under "From the Pastor." Please be assured that the Mass intentions you have requested at St. Anastasia will be offered and said by me on the date requested. I invite you to make a spiritual communion several times a day. Refer to the "From the Pastor" for more information on spiritual communion.

All recurring and ongoing Parish meetings and events will be cancelled through March 31. The Communal Penance service scheduled for April 1 is also cancelled. The Lenten Fish Fry scheduled for Friday, March 20 will be TAKE OUT ONLY and will be our last fish fry of this season.

The Church will be open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., Saturday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Sunday from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon for individual prayer. Eucharistic Adoration will take place Monday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Please adhere to the directive for a maximum capacity of 10 parishioners at a time. Stations of the Cross booklets and St. Theresè Novena booklets are available by the Baptismal font for your personal prayer. Please leave them in the Church.

The Parish office will remain open Monday-Friday from 8:30 a.m.- 4:30 p.m. Please continue to check our website, Facebook, Instagram and Twitter @stanastasiacc for updates, changes and opportunities for spiritual support.

Thank you for your understanding, patience and perseverance during this time. I will continue to keep each of you and your families in my prayers, trusting and believing in the loving providence of our Lord, Jesus Christ and in the intercession of our Blessed Mother.
